**V Session 2G: Creative TF-CBT Techniques for Traumatized Children (Part 1)**

Trauma-Focused Cognitive-Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT) is an empirically-supported psychotherapy model for treating traumatized children and adolescents. The effectiveness of the approach is enhanced by integrating creative, developmentally appropriate interventions so children will engage in treatment. TF-CBT is a components-based approach. The treatment components are: Psychoeducation, Relaxation, Affective modulation, Cognitive processing, Trauma narrative, In vivo mastery, Conjoint child-parent sessions, and Enhancing safety. Creative therapeutic techniques will be presented for each of the eight treatment components. Therapeutic games, art, stories, and other engaging activities will be presented for use with traumatized children and youth. Workshop participants will come away with many new and innovative techniques and strategies to add to their existing repertoire.

He will challenge them to work as a team, putting aside personal feelings, attitudes and any inhibitions team members may have, in order to conduct better abuse investigations. 10:00am – 11:30am	<p><b>I Session 4L: Understanding &amp; Investigating Child Burn Injuries</b></p> <p><i>Speakers: Jim Holler</i></p> <p>Infants and toddlers are most likely to be burned intentionally. Child abuse burn victims are typically under the age of 10 with the majority of them being under the age of 2. Immediate identification of intentional burn victims by those individuals first responding to the call for assistance is crucial because most of the victims are unable to speak for themselves. This workshop will provide law enforcement officers and CPS workers with information that will assist them in distinguishing the difference between intentional and accidental burns. It will also assist the investigator by providing methods that can be used in recreating the incident to help prove or disprove the caregiver's statements as to how the burns were sustained.</p>	Michigan Ballroom

After more than thirty years of Children's Advocacy Center development, much has been accomplished in the movement to protect children and to hold offenders accountable. New workers come into child protection from many different professions, ready and willing to partner with others to do the best for children at risk for abuse. It is also incumbent upon us, however, to also remember how the movement has grown so far and so fast. A good knowledge of our past helps us to ensure that we do not fall back into old patterns of behavior, rather that we continue a future that is bright for children and for our teams. In this plenary session, information will be delivered about the earliest beginning of the CAC movement, how we learned as we grew, perfecting the process of the development and support for children and for our Children's Advocacy Centers.

One of the most difficult aspects of working within a multidisciplinary environment is that the lines of leadership and reporting authority are almost always of the dotted line variety. Key questions for CAC directors and their counterparts are 1) how do we lead people over whom we have no authority, and 2) how do we engage others to work together in a mutually beneficial and respectful way 3) How do we create a work environment where both "boomers and millennial s" can find fulfillment? In this workshop we will discuss strategies that work to make us all better leaders and to enhance the work of the team to provide better services for the children we serve.

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2:15pm – 3:45pm **I Session 5R: Interviewing Children About Repeated Abuse** Peninsula Ballroom

Many children experience multiple abusive events and on multiple occasions. When abuse is long-standing, children typically develop and report "script" or "gist" memories, which actually are a compilation of multiple events. Forensic interviewers often struggle when attempting challenged to assist children in recalling particular episodes that are helpful for investigative purposes and for making legal decisions. This can be a daunting task for the children who have experienced the most abuse or those who are young or have cognitive challenges.

This training will review the research on the formation of episodic and script memories for repeated events. Alternative interview approaches will be discussed, as well as, a review of common interview practice in this area. The training will provide practical suggestions, as well as cautions.

This workshop identifies strategies for identifying and responding to human trafficking focusing on the vulnerabilities of potential victims and the response from those who encounter victims of labor and sexual exploitation.
